About Pomo Honoring Month

Pomo Honoring Month is organized by local volunteers from the Pomo Project to foster awareness of Pomo history and traditions, support Pomo people having an active voice in contemporary challenges, and value collaboration with all Pomo people toward reconciliation and understanding.

For 13,000 years, Pomo people have lived in Sonoma County. The site of their village, Batikletcawi (where elderberry grows), was on the bank of the Laguna de Santa Rosa, where Sebastopol now stands.

A 2010 Sebastopol City Council Resolution designated October Pomo Honoring Month, saying: "The Pomo maintained a harmonious relationship with ecology of the area, including knowledgeable and respectful harvesting of animals, plants, and mineral resources...," and "their wisdom and crafts traditions hold important values for our community...." The resolution encourages "business owners, educators, artists and all our citizens to participate in making each October an occasion for joy, learning, and prosperity."
